Question 2 - "Should I cover my air conditioner in the winter?"

It's a good idea to protect your air conditioner condenser from leaves and debris that can get into it, but there are some ways to avoid. Its not a good idea to completely cover the entire unit with a cover. This can trap moisture against the metal surface and cause your air conditioner to rust. I

have seen some covers that are designed to 'breathe' and let moisture escape, but I have no experience to know if they work.

Alternatively, just cover the opening on top of the unit to keep stuff out and leave the sides free. This avoids trapping moisture. Some people do this with a piece of plywood or a trash can lid with a brick on it to hold it down. While this can provide protection – if you

remember to do it - it can be a bit of an eyesore.

A far better solution is a Kool Kap, which provides year-round protection to keep leaves and debris out of the condenser. This is a slick product that actually harnesses the air that is exhausted from the top of the condenser to lift the cover up anytime the unit is running. This means the top is covered the entire year. See the nearby insert for more details.

Question 3 - "Where should I locate my carbon monoxide monitor?"

'By the furnace' is what most people think, but there is a location that provides more protection, especially if you only have one CO alarm. The better answer? In your bedroom, and located on a dresser that is higher than you are when you sleep. Here's why:

If the source of the carbon monoxide is your furnace, the highest concentration of CO is in the middle of the night when it is the coldest time of the day and your furnace or boiler is running the most. This is typically when most people are asleep, so this is why the best location is in your bedroom.

Next, carbon monoxide is lighter than air. So as CO fills up your bedroom it is falling from the ceiling toward the floor. This is why you want your CO alarm to be located above you - so the alarm will sound before you are affected by the poisonous gas. This means

that you don't want a CO alarm that plugs into a wall outlet, because outlets are typically within a foot of the floor.

You're much safer with a battery powered alarm - and even better if it is a low-level CO monitor that sounds the alarm as soon as there is a problem - unlike typical CO alarms. The concern with most CO alarms is that the design standard - UL 2034 - allows an alarm to take up to 4 hours to warn you and at much higher CO levels. I recommend the NSI 3000 low-level monitor. See the insert for details.

Question 4 - How often should I replace my furnace filter?"

The answer to this question depends on a few factors. The general rule of thumb is that if you have a 1" furnace filter that it should be changed every 4 - 6 weeks while a 3-1/2" wide or greater pleated media filter can be changed annually. However, environmental circumstances can affect the frequency of either filter types. In houses with smokers or where there are hobbies that create dust - such

as woodworking - filters may need to be changed more often. In these circumstances the filter should be inspected frequently to gauge whether it should be changed sooner. Tip: have an extra new filter on hand for comparison purposes.

Caution: avoid 1" filters with a very high MERV rating - like electrostatic filters. These filters are more expensive and boast that they provide high efficiency filtration. The problem is that filters with high MERV ratings restrict the airflow your HVAC system needs to perform well and will raise your electric bill and shorten equipment life. The main purpose of a furnace filter is to protect your equipment - indoor air quality is only a secondary side benefit. If you have breathing issues that you are trying to help, consider a bypass filter system with HEPA filtration that cleans household air without restricting airflow and harming your HVAC equipment and system performance. I will address this in a future issue.
