Consumer Beware: Some Popular Energy Saving Advice Can Backfire and End Up Costing You More – Part 1

A classic theme of science fiction stories is one in which a scientific advancement goes wrong and becomes a disaster - like in the Jurassic Park movie series. The new technology is overcome by unintended consequences that create greater problems than those that are solved. I think the same thing about new drugs when I see a television ad

promoting them. First you hear about all the wonderful benefits of the new medicine and then you have 45 seconds of warnings about all the dire side effects. "The good news is your condition may be relieved; the bad news is you may grow a third eye where your nose used to be!"

There are similar unintended consequences that occur

in homes due to energy saving measures. In some instances well intentioned efforts achieve the opposite result and more energy is used after the measure than before. For example...

The Unintended Consequence of Air Duct Sealing

measure today. It is promoted by the U.S. government on such websites

as EnergyStar.gov. In fact sometimes there are utility rebates and tax credits to seal air ducts. The reason for air duct sealing is that if your house is typical about 20% to 30% of the air being circulated by vour furnace through your homes ductwork is lost due to leaks, holes and poorly connected ducts. This can result in higher utility bills and lost comfort. Air duct sealing fixes the leaks, which should lower the amount of energy needed - and it can - except if the ductwork is inadequate or poorly designed. This, unfortunately, is typical in the U.S.

Here is the problem: if the ductwork is undersized on the return side - there is not enough ductwork for the air returning to the furnace to be heated or cooled - just sealing the leaks and holes in the ductwork without fixing the ductwork design flaws will make a bad situation

worse. The same thing is true for inadequate supply ductwork for heated or cooled air being delivered to your registers. In either scenario the intended airflow is decreased.

Here is why: in this situation on the return side the holes and leaks actually help provide air the furnace or air conditioning needs to function. Sealing these leaks will 'starve' your system for air and thereby reduce performance and make the system run longer and in turn use more energy. On the supply side sealing inadequate ductwork acts as a bottleneck and has the same result. In both cases it also makes your system work harder and puts more wear and tear on your equipment.

This is not to say that sealing your air ducts does not provide benefits. Leaky return ducts in crawl spaces and other unclean and unconditioned areas can

such in contaminants such as mold or insulation - causing dust and poor indoor air quality. Leaky supply ducts waste the heated or cooled air intended for elsewhere. Fixing these problems are good - but it may not have the intended energy savings if the only issue that is addressed is duct sealing without considering other important factors.

So is air duct sealing a good idea? Absolutely but you need to have your ductwork checked first to make sure it is adequate and correct it if it isn't. Then have your air ducts sealed. In fact, duct corrections with sealing will make your home more comfortable and can use up to 40% less energy to heat or cool your house. Next month I will begin to address how you can reclaim some of this lost energy the right way. -
